FROM THE MAYOR

PARKING AND THE WATER TOWER PROPERTY

Usually I use my space in the newsletter to highlight upcoming events in Cranbury, but this time I want to explain the Township Committee's efforts to acquire for a municipal parking lot the property where the water tower used to stand.

Let's start at the beginning. Does Cranbury need more parking? A document titled Cranbury Business District Study dated January 19, 1999, and prepared by Clarke Caton Hintz and Urban Partners, indicates that it does. The study's parking analysis concludes that, if every available public parking space was occupied, Cranbury's downtown would still be 58 parking spaces short. The numbers of restaurants, delicatessens and specialty shops that exist now are remarkably similar to those in existence at the time the study was completed. To my knowledge, the only public parking spots that have been created since the study was issued are the four spots along the road that leads to the soccer fields. So Cranbury should still be short 54 parking spaces.

We became aware of New Jersey American Water's interest in selling the property in mid-March. The Township Administrator notified the water company on March 18th of Cranbury's interest in buying the property. The water company told her the property had appraised at \$125,000, that there was another party interested in the property, and that the company preferred to sell to the municipality.

On April 8th the Township submitted in writing a formal offer of \$125,000. On April 16th the water company notified us that the other party had raised its offer higher than Cranbury's and had taken all contingencies out of the contract. Suddenly the water company's position changed 180 degrees, and it said it felt compelled to accept the highest bid for the property.

On April 22nd the Township Committee adopted an ordinance to offer \$150,000 for the property. On April 25th the water company notified us that the other party had substantially raised their offer.

On May 3rd the Township received a document the water company filed with the Board of Public Utilities indicating that they were in contract to sell to the other party for \$180,000.

Where does this leave us? Cranbury can condemn the property under its eminent domain rights. In preparation for this, we have arranged to have the property appraised. This is where the situation gets really complicated. Apparently the appraisal may reflect the use to which the property will be put. An appraisal for residential use will be less than for a municipal parking lot, because there is an assumption that the Township will derive revenue from the parking lot. The Township Committee has no intention of putting meters on those parking spaces, but the appraisal may reflect a price calculated from the potential revenues. In addition, we have been advised that condemnation is a very long and costly process.

The Township Committee continues to do its due diligence on this issue. Cranbury became the community it is through the efforts of public-spirited residents. It is possible that the proven needs of your community may go unmet because the other bidder was unconstrained in their bidding by normal market forces.

The Voter Registration deadline for this election will be **July 23, 2013.**





SUMMER CRIME PREVENTION

With the summer vacationing months upon us, we should consider taking a few basic security precautions to protect our homes and property.

If you are going on vacation, it is recommended that you:

- Set your burglar alarm.
- Have someone pick up your newspapers and packages.

Please make sure your key holder has your alarm code. As required by Township Ordinance, all business and residential alarms must be registered with the police department. The Cranbury Police Department offers free home security surveys. During the survey, an officer will check your doors, windows and locks. If any improvements are needed, the officer will write them down and present the list to the homeowner. PET ETIQUETTE and BEING A RESPONSIBLE PET OWNER



Once again, this issue needs to be brought to some pet owners' attention. Believe it or not, some pet owners feel it is not necessary to clean up behind their pets! And there are some BIG dogs out there whose pet owners really should carry a couple plastic bags to pick up after them.

Township Ordinance #162-2.1B states that "All pet owners and keepers shall immediately remove and properly dispose of the solid waste deposited by the pet on public property or the property of another". Township Ordinance #162-3 Violations and penalties: Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any provision of this article shall, upon conviction thereof, be punishable by a fine not exceeding \$500 or by imprisonment for a term not exceeding 90 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the Judge. It's easier and cheaper to be a responsible pet owner, clean up after your pet! Others are watching!

MOSQUITO CONTROL



It won't be long until those pesky mosquito insects make themselves known. Fortunately, it is a known fact that mosquitoes need water to breed, so take a look around your yard for a continuous water habitat that holds water from 7 to 10 days. It can be anything from gutters, birdbaths, watering cans, flower pot saucers, tires, swimming pools, fish ponds, even rain barrels to freshwater swamps, Stagnant water, even storm drains. You can decrease their breeding areas by eliminating some habitats. Clean your roof gutters, change the water in the birdbaths, turn shallow containers upside down, filter pools and install a bat house. 



SHADE TREE COMMISSION

Tree Safety in Summer Storms



Summer brings intense storms with strong winds and heavy rain. Our hurricane season officially began June 1, which considerably ups the ante. Thus, it's very important to check large trees before storms begin, to prevent future damage from dropping limbs or toppling, particularly of trees close to houses.

After going through Hurricane Sandy, we've all learned how much damage trees can do. In storms with lots of rain, tree canopies can become saturated and much heavier. When they catch the strong winds, there is much more leverage, which can increase the chances of tree failure.

Examine your trees carefully, using small binoculars if necessary, to check for problems, and don't wait until the day before a storm to do this. You may want to consult a professional licensed arborist to advise you about storm preparedness.

Problems to watch for include "hangers", or broken limbs hanging high up in the canopy, which may break loose in a storm and fall. Wires in contact with branches are extremely dangerous and should be taken out by a professional. Cracked limbs and V-shaped forks can fail in a storm, whereas U-shaped forks are not as dangerous. Peeling bark and extensive wounds indicate structural weaknesses, as do hollow trunks or mushrooms growing out of a trunk. Heaving soil at the base of a tree may mean high winds have already levered the tree and caused root damage, so that the next storm may topple it.

After Sandy, some tree crews showed up from distant places offering to top healthy trees, that is, cut back all the major limbs. This practice is common in some European countries where high winds are common, for example, The Netherlands, but it is not often done here and can seriously weaken a tree. Disease can enter an otherwise healthy tree through extensive cutting, especially of major limbs. And future growth is compromised by this sort of large-scale pruning.

If a tree is so close to the house and so large as to be a major hazard in a big storm, you may want to consider removing it. Taking down a healthy, mature tree is always a heart-wrenching decision and one not take lightly, but it may be prudent. And when considering replanting, you may want to put in a much smaller tree that won't cause problems when it achieves maturity.

FIREWORKS DISPLAY

On July 5th, Cranbury Township will host a fireworks display that will be held in Village Park. Bring your picnic blanket, chairs, dinner and friends to enjoy the show!

ENVIRONMENTAL COMMISSION

RAIN BARRELS



Once again this year, the Environmental Commission has donated rain barrels to Cranbury School. The first year the barrel was decorated by Tamara Woronczuk's 4th grade art class with scenes inspired by a visit to the Unami Woods. It was a very successful project that brought students to one of the preserved open spaces in Cranbury, enabling them to convey what they saw and felt through painting.

This year, the two donated barrels will be used by Bridget Lundquist's 5th grade science class in the butterfly Zen garden created in the science courtyard by members of the Scout troop in that class. Buddleia, asters, hibiscus and hasta were among the 11 different items planted. Shasta daisies, hydrangea, bleeding heart, burning bush, honeysuckle and iris that had been previously planted were reused.

The students see the courtyard as a beautiful focal point for the school. The Environmental Commission sees the barrels a way of promoting the conservation of water for use during dry spells as well as a means of stressing the importance of this vitally precious resource.

STREAM CLEAN UP

Forty-eight volunteers picked up 61 bags of trash (644 pounds!) at the annual Stream Clean-Up sponsored by the Cranbury Township Environmental Commission and the Stony Brook-Millstone Watershed Association on Saturday, April 13. The most common litter was beer caps, bottles and food wrappers. The most notable litter was a coconut and a wood pallet!

SUSTAINABLE NEW JERSEY

The Environmental Commission has submitted an application to attain Bronze level status "Sustainable Jersey" certification for Cranbury. The Commission has formed a "Green Team" from among its members to advise the Township on issues of environmental and energy sustainability. Sustainable Jersey is a voluntary program for municipalities in New Jersey that want to go green, save money, and take steps to sustain and improve residents' quality of life over the long term.

In support of the initiative, the Township Committee passed a Sustainable Land Use Pledge Resolution put forth by the "Green Team". The resolution affirms the Township's intention to support sustainable smart-growth land use policies that "lead to land use decisions that balance economic, environmental, and social needs and provide the highest possible quality of life for all residents". The pledge addresses such topics as energy efficiency, preserving and protecting open space, recycling, native species planting, transportation options and walkability.

Through the hard work of many volunteers and township employees, Cranbury has already taken action on many of these items. With this resolution, the township will continue to assess land use decisions to maintain and even improve the quality of life we all enjoy in Cranbury.

ENVIRONMENTAL COMMISSION

EIGHTH GRADE ALFRED MEISS ENVIRONMENTAL APPRECIATION AWARD

At the annual Awards Night at the Cranbury School on June 6, 8th grader Edward Gu was awarded the fourth annual Alfred Meiss Environmental Appreciation Award! The award was established in 2010 by the Cranbury Environmental Commission to honor past resident Alfred Meiss, who was instrumental in preserving much of the natural resource areas that Cranbury residents cherish and enjoy. An award is presented annually to the 8th grade student whom the Commission believes best captures Mr. Meiss' vision of the appreciation, beauty and enjoyment that Cranbury's natural resources would bring to the township's future residents.

REINHARDT PRESERVE

The Association for New Jersey Environmental Commissions awarded Cranbury Township a grant of \$1,500 for the trails and signage. Planning for the trails will begin presently. The public will be invited to attend workshop meetings, and a grand opening of the new trails in April next year!



CRANBURY BROOK PRESERVE PLANTING

If late spring and early summer rains don't drown the seeds planted by members of the Environmental Commission, native wildflowers should be sprouting in about six weeks in the Cranbury Brook Preserve. A total of eight plots were cleared and planted, five in the first grassland field and three in the second.

The native warm season grasses were planted in 2007 to restore the habitat and encourage the return of grassland nesting bird species whose numbers had declined due to the changes in land use and consequent reduction of grassland acreage. The wildflower seeds were purchased by the Environmental Commission with funds specifically set aside for planting natives in the Cranbury Brook Preserve.

Although the second field looks very attractive right now, with an abundance of purple flowers and butterflies, looks are deceiving! These flowers are invasive non-natives and are smothering the native grasses and killing them. The seeds from this year's flowers will help disburse and reseed some of the grasslands.

Additional plots will be dug up and reseeded next year. The wildflowers, a mix of perennials and annuals that include lattice leaf coreopsis, wild sienna, butterfly milk weed, oxeye sunflower, tall white beardtongue and New England aster will help beautify our Cranbury Brook Preserve with a splash of color throughout the growing season and help attract butterflies and other insects.

ENVIRONMENTAL COMMISSION

NO NET LOSS REFORESTATION PHASE III

The Turnpike Tree Subcommittee co-chairs, Barbara Rogers and Kathy Easton, presented recommendations to the Township Committee to pursue a state No Net Loss Reforestation Act Phase III grant. The Township became eligible for funding from the New Jersey Turnpike Authority under the state No Net Loss Reforestation Act when 50 acres of forested township land was lost to the NJ Turnpike Widening Project. The Turnpike Tree Subcommittee, composed of members from five different township boards, identified available and suitable municipally owned lands to plant trees on. This third round of recommendations included planting a total of three hundred trees on five different Township-owned locations ---Cranbury Brook Preserve, Village Park, Barn Park, Reinhardt Preserve and the Fischer Property.

According to the plan, Cranbury Preserve and the Fischer Property will each receive one hundred trees. The Tree Subcommittee sees this grant as an opportunity to replace exotic plants with native tree species and reforest open spaces used by Cranbury citizens for passive recreation. The recommendations also included the removal of a large mound of soil and debris near the entrance to the Cranbury Preserve, thus enhancing the entrance to the preserve and creating a contiguous tree line with the Phase II trees being planted along the gravel road.

Although the Fisher Property is composed of approximately 32 acres currently being used for agriculture, the subcommittee requested the Township Committee approve a border of trees be planted along the wooded area of the property to create a trail from South Main Street to the Hagerty Property on Old Cranbury Road. Township Committee member David Cook questioned whether this would interfere with the farming vista from South Main Street, and both chairs reiterated that the proposal only calls for a line of trees along the forested area of the Fischer Property. They promoted the positives of beginning a trail system along the Millstone River that is part of the 2010 Cranbury Township Master Plan. The new trail would also connect Fisher Property with the trail in the newly planted Hagerty Property. As Barbara Rogers stated, "Creating this trail system is an opportunity to provide access to public lands that can be enjoyed by all Township residents."

Two other parks, Village Park and Barn Parks, will have a total of fifty trees planted along their borders to provide privacy for homeowners and to beautify the parks.

Reinhardt Preserve, a newly-acquired Township open space property, will have fifty trees planted to enhance a staggered line of trees being planted as part of Phase II. These trees will help form a border between the parking lot and the private property adjacent to it. They will also provide shade for cars in the parking lot and help guide patrons to the entrance to the Preserve's walking trails.

The Tree Subcommittee has been working for over three years on the three different phases of the No Net Loss Reforestation Project. Township Committee member Dan Mulligan thanked the co-chairs for their hard work and dedication. Dr. Rogers responded, "It's been a labor of love" because the addition of trees on Township properties creates a more sustainable environment and improves the overall quality of life for the citizens of Cranbury.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

RECYCLING SHED

The Recycling Shed is located at the DPW yard on Dey Rd. It is open to Cranbury residents only on the first Friday of each month between the hours of 9am and 12pm. Should a holiday occur on this date, the shed will open on the second Friday.

Acceptable items include:

- E-cycle: computer components (desktops, laptops, cables, keyboards, modem, monitor, mouse, CPU tower) printers, scanners, stereos, televisions, telephones (cordless, cellular), extension cords, stereos, irons
- Fluorescent Bulbs: compact and tube bulbs (up to 4 foot in length).
- Mercury thermostats and thermometers.
- Polystyrene: formed polystyrene is compressed formed white packing Styrofoam that is usually used in large size shipments. Food containers and packing peanuts are unacceptable. Please do not place polystyrene in with the curbside collection program; this item must be brought it to the Recycle Shed for proper recycling.



SEPTEMBER 2013 STREET SWEEPING

In time for Cranbury Day (September 7th), all Township roads will be swept by Reilly Sweeping on September 3rd, 4th (early morning), and 5th. Your cooperation by removing trash bins, basketball hoops, cars or other personal equipment from the street that fronts your property will allow the sweeper truck to make a clean and expeditious pass.



Should you be unable to remove your parked vehicle from the street in time for the early morning sweeps, use of the municipal parking lots for overnight parking is allowed. There are three available lots. One municipal lot is located in front of the senior housing complex on Park Place West. There are four off street parking spaces near the entrance of the Cranbury Brook Preserve, and of course, Village Park. Feel free to use these lots; parking spaces are on a first-come basis.

Chipping should not be at the curb but can be placed at the street/curb beginning September 15th. The collection of leaves will begin October 29th; there should be no leaf piles at the curb.

Your cooperation in keeping Cranbury branch free for Cranbury Day is truly appreciated.

SHRED-IT EVENT



On August 10, 2013 from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. (or until the shred truck is full, which ever occurs first) a shred-it event will be held at the Cranbury Township Department of Public Works Yard located at 100 Dey Road, . This event is sponsored by the Middlesex County Board of Chosen Freeholders and is open to all Middlesex County residents.

A maximum of five file boxes or a maximum of 100 pounds per resident per visit will be enforced at the event. If you arrive with more than that, five boxes or a maximum of 100 pounds of paper to be shredded, you will be asked to return to the end of the line. This is done so all residents receive their fair share to dispose of their items at this event.

Acceptable items included old files, receipts, bills, financial statements, medical EOBs, or any documents that you have not recycled due to confidentiality concerns. There is no need to remove paper clips, staples, or paperboard binder covers. You can observe the shredding of these documents on site.

CURBSIDE PROGRAM AND RECYCLING IN CRANBURY

Here are a few simple and common sense thoughts when placing your recyclables at the curb for the early Monday morning curbside pickups or when visiting the Recycle Shed:



CURBSIDE COLLECTION PROGRAM

Round container: plastic (#1 & #2), glass (no drinking glasses) aluminum, and tin.

- Wash/rinse/clean the containers before placing them in the blue round container at the curb
- Remove all caps and empty containers of liquids. At the recycling facility, the collected materials travel on a conveyer belt. Light weight items get 'blown' off the belt first while heavier materials, like glass bottles, travel further down the belt until it reaches the proper weight area. When liquids are left in the containers, it adds weight and will ultimately be bundled in with same weighted products which are not of the same recycle class. These co-mingled material bundles are referred to as contaminated and are of lesser value.
- Do not place the co-mingled plastic, glass, aluminum, and tin recyclables in plastic bags. Place all contents into the round container. Plastic bags have a tendency to clog the sorting machinery at the recycling facility. It will ultimately cause machinery malfunctions and downtime.




Square container: commingled newsprint; magazines; junk mail; paper shopping bags; chip board-cereal boxes, shoe boxes, etc.



Cardboard: break or flatten the boxes, then bundle and place at the curb. Don't discard cardboard in your trash cans. Keep this valuable material out of the landfill. Recycle it so Cranbury can receive Recycling Tonnage Grant credit (money!!!).

Textiles: place torn, worn, clean garments/clothes/textiles not worthy of donating in a plastic bag labeled "TEXTILES" at the curb during the normal scheduled curbside service. These items will be recycled into another useful product. Unacceptable items are comforters and rugs.

Once your recycling containers have emptied, take a look around to make certain that any stray items did not fall onto the ground.

CUT IT AND LEAVE IT/GRASSCYCLING



Grasscycling is the natural way to have a green, healthy lawn while spending less time and money! You can be the envy of your neighbors with a beautiful lawn with much less work and expense. Wouldn't you rather be sipping an ice cold summer-time drink in the shade, rather than spending time emptying the collected grass clippings? A typical lawn of 5,000 square feet generates about 75 pounds of clippings per mowing. Lawn experts at Rutgers University and other research centers have found that that by mowing frequently (five to six times a month) and not bagging those clippings can save lawn owners up to 35% of the time spent on routine lawn care!

There are five easy tips to achieve a great looking lawn:

- Any lawn mower works but a mulching mower will produce the best results
- Mow high! Removing only 1/3 of grass blade will decrease your mowing time.
- Keep the mower blade sharp. This will prevent torn grass blade tips which can invite lawn disease.
- Water in the morning to a depth of one inch to encourage deep roots
- Can't stress this one enough! Do not over fertilize!! Grasscycled lawns need fertilizer only once or twice a year.

FERTILIZER APPLICATION REMINDER



If you are thinking about applying fertilizer to your lawn remember:

- Any fertilizer sold or used in New Jersey is required to have at least 20% of its nitrogen in slow release (water insoluble) form. Excess nitrogen loading in waterways causes algae blooms, which greatly disrupt marine ecosystems. Since grass can only use a limited amount of water-soluble nitrogen in one feeding, left over water-soluble fertilizer will either leach to the water table, or it will get washed away as runoff. In both cases it ends up in waterways. Slow release fertilizer formulas are less water-soluble and decrease the amount of nitrogen in waterways.
- Phosphorus is banned from lawn fertilizer except in special cases. Phosphorus is the major cause of eutrophication in fresh water, which causes algae blooms and disrupts ecosystems as well..
- Fertilizer cannot be applied before March 1 and after November 15 for homeowners and after December 1 for lawn care professionals.
- Fertilizer may not be applied to frozen ground, before a heavy rainfall occurs or is predicted, or when the soil is saturated.
- Application of fertilizer is prohibited within 25 feet of any water body, unless a drop spreader, rotary spreader with deflector or targeted spray liquid is used, then the buffer may be reduced to 10 feet.
- On January 5, 2011, Governor Christie signed a statewide [lawn fertilizer bill](#) (A-2290). This bill will help protect and restore all water bodies in New Jersey, most of which are suffering from excess loading of nitrogen and/or phosphorus.





Prevent Mosquito breeding sites: Eliminate standing water (especially in the shade) on your property by disposing of empty cans, buckets, old tires, trash cans, etc. Those you want to save, turn upside down frequently or punch holes in the bottom so water drains out. Change water in bird-baths at least once a week. Empty flower saucers. Clean clogged roof gutters. Empty plastic pools and other toys when not in use. Stock ornamental ponds with fish that eat mosquitoes.

WHITE GOOD & E-CYCLE PROGRAMS

Did you know that for only \$10 per item the DPW can pick up your unwanted appliance or e-waste at your curb? Items include bulky electronic waste such as TVs, VCRs, computers with components, metal storm doors (without glass window inserts) humidifiers/de-humidifiers, water coolers, metal sinks, stoves/ovens, dishwashers, washers, dryers, water tanks, refrigerators, freezers, outdoor grills with tanks, and residential kitchen exhaust fans. Pick up is scheduled to occur every 2nd Wednesday of each month and you must call (395-0900 ext.229) to be placed on the schedule prior to that Wednesday or for more information. If you prefer, you may transport these items down to the DPW yard located at 100 Dey Road when the Recycle Shed is open. Due to limited personnel, help will not be available to help unload heavy white good items.

PROPER DISPOSAL OF SMOKE ALARMS

Old smoke alarms should not be discarded into your trash. Sending these old alarms back to the manufacturer for proper disposal is best via the USPS mail system. Cranbury Township is very fortunate to be a part of Middlesex County. There are many opportunities available for Cranbury residents and businesses to help keep items out of the landfill. There's info on free composting workshops along with how and where to purchase compost bins.

CLEAN UP WEEKEND

Mark your calendar! September 28th & 29th is Clean Up Weekend (rain or shine). Bring your discards to the DPW Yard at 99 Dey Road; the hours of operation will be 9:00am to 3:00pm. The DPW crew will be on site to help unload your unwanted discards.

Acceptable materials include e-cycle (electronics), scrap metal, lumber, and household items that are too large to fit inside your trash tote. If you are uncertain if an item is acceptable, please call Town Hall at 395-0900, x 229 and ask.

NO household trash, paint or hazardous waste items will be accepted. For your convenience, Middlesex County offers household hazardous waste drop off days for county residents to properly dispose of these materials. Dates, times and locations for these events can be found at: http://www.cranburytownship.org/recycling_main.html. Click on the appropriate link.

The clean up weekend service is open to Cranbury residents only. Be prepared to show proof of residency, such as a tax bill. A driver license may indicate 'Cranbury, NJ' but it is not necessarily Cranbury Township where you reside. Review your tax bill prior to coming to the DPW yard; this will indicate what municipality you live in. Thank you for respecting this valuable program.

CURBSIDE CHIPPING SERVICE

Many of Cranbury residents are aware that chipping brush/branches begins on the third Wednesday of each month. This is the start date and not necessarily the day that your brush will be chipped. Branches to be chipped should be placed curbside, parallel to the road, not in the street, the weekend prior to the third Wednesday. To help expedite the process, cut branch ends should be placed so the largest cut ends follows (not face) the flow of traffic. The cut ends can be easily picked up by the DPW crew to insert into the hopper without having to turn the limbs around.

Two different types of machinery are used. A chipper is used for the chipping of branches/limbs and a vacuum type is used to collect leaves. So please do not place branches/limbs and leaves together in one pile for pick-up. Keep these items piled separately. Branches up to 8" in diameter can be chipped; larger branches will not fit into the hopper.

The Township Code Chapter 69; Chipping, Leaves & Brush state that placement of brush shall be allowed no sooner than the weekend preceding the third Wednesday of each month, or as otherwise scheduled or announced. Please take care not to place the chipping and or leaves in the street or near storm drain inlets. Doing so allows rain runoff to flow freely and can prevent water pollution.

Chipping date in the month of: Place chipping curbside no sooner than:

July 17th
August 21st

July 13th
August 17th

Here are the eight criterions for curbside chipping according to Chapter 69. It is the same as the orange violation notices that have been and will be distributed to violators. If you have not done so already, please familiarize yourself so you know the requirements.

Warning notices will be issued to inform you how the chipping in front of your property does not fit the chipping criteria. Three warning notices will be issued prior to being fined.



1. It is recommended that residents notify the DPW office to request the chipping services by the Monday before the third Wednesday of the month.
2. Brush should be placed curbside no sooner than the weekend preceding the third Wednesday of each month, or as otherwise scheduled or announced.
3. All material to be chipped should be placed at the curb by 7:00 a.m. by the scheduled collection date (3rd Wednesday of the month). Any material placed curbside after the scheduled collection date or time will not be chipped. Please understand that the DPW will not return or back track to your property while working the scheduled route once they have passed by.
4. All materials should be stacked parallel to the curb or as near to the curb as possible. Take care not to place them in the street or on the sidewalk. Place the cut branch ends together so they follow the flow of traffic.
5. Items must be placed parallel to the curb or along the street that is **directly abutting your property line**.
6. Branches exceeding 8" diameter cannot be chipped. Brush should be at least 3' in length. Although 3' is the minimum length, longer branches are much easier to chip.
7. Hedge clippings, twigs and small branches less than 3' (but not less than 1') must be bundled with string only (NO WIRE) and must be free of foreign debris, such as stones, dirt, metal, sweepings and rakings.
8. No lumber, construction material, roots, stumps, mulch, sand, landscape construction material and debris, or soil left at the curb will be collected.

DID YOU KNOW??

Before selling a home or renting an apartment in the Township of Cranbury, the owner must obtain a Certificate of Smoke Detector and Carbon Monoxide Alarm Compliance. The application can either be picked up at the Clerk's Office in Town Hall or on the Township web site. Fees for a Certificate of Smoke Detector & Carbon Monoxide Alarm Compliance are as follows:



Request received more than 10 business days prior to change of occupant - \$ 45.00

Request received 4 to 10 business days prior to change of occupant - \$ 70.00

Request received fewer than 4 business days prior to change of occupant - \$125.00

Once the notarized application and fee are received by the Township, the Fire Official will schedule an inspection. Directions concerning the smoke detectors, carbon monoxide alarms and fire extinguishers are attached to the Application. All detectors, alarms and extinguishers should be thoroughly checked before the Fire Official's inspection to avoid a second inspection. ATTENTION ALL LANDLORDS:



Pursuant to N.J.A.C. 5:29-1.1, it is a requirement that any single unit dwellings and two (2) unit dwellings that are not owner-occupied must be filed in the Office of the Clerk, Town Hall, 23-A North Main Street.

In addition, tenants in multiple dwellings are required to be given a copy of the Certificate of Registration filed with the Bureau of Housing Inspection in accordance with N.J.S.A. 55:13A-12, N.J.S.A. 46:8-28 and N.J.A.C. 5:10-1.11. (Contact the Bureau of Housing Inspection, P.O. Box 810, Trenton, New Jersey 08625 (609) 633-6240 for registration applications for buildings with three (3) or more dwelling units.

You may obtain a copy of the form by faxing your request to (609) 984-7954 or going to the Department of Community Affairs web site, Landlord-Tenant Information Service.

There are several non-owner occupied dwellings in the Township of Cranbury that have not submitted the required paperwork.

AUTUMN LEAF COLLECTION

Autumn leaf collection will begin October 28th and will continue up through the last full week in December. Residents may place leaves between the sidewalk and curb or if you live where there are no sidewalks or curbs, put the leaves close to the street. If parking is allowed on the street in front of your house and there is no available room for the pile due to parked cars, please rake the leaves to an area where the DPW crew will be able to gain access to them. A driveway entrance or the closest street corner is a good place. If you feel that the DPW crew can miss the pile, call Town Hall at 395-0900 x229 and inform us where the leaf pile has been placed.

As a reminder: branches, vines, grass clippings and other debris **cannot** be collected with the leaf vacuum. These items can cause a safety issue and will break the equipment. Be watchful of placement of the debris at the curb, non-point source pollution (NPS) if washed down the storm drains can occur.


Residents not living on the above route but desire leaf collection service should call 395-0900 ext.229 to be placed on the schedule. Barring inclement weather, the amount of leaves, or machinery breakdowns, the route usually takes approximately 2 to 2 ½ weeks to complete.

During the final leaf collection week, once the DPW and leaf vacuum have collected your leaf pile, do not replenish it. They will be done collecting leaves for 2013. Thank you for the cooperation.

2013 WHITE GOODS & E-CYCLE PROGRAMS

Did you know that for only \$10 per item the DPW can take away your unwanted appliance or e-waste? Items include bulky electronic waste such as TVs, VCRs, computers with components, metal storm doors (without glass window inserts) humidifiers/dehumidifiers, water coolers, metal sinks, stoves/ovens, dishwashers, washers, dryers, water tanks, refrigerators, outdoor grills with tanks, and residential kitchen exhaust fans. Pick up is scheduled for every 2nd Wednesday of each month but you must call (395-0900 ext.229) to be placed on the schedule. If you prefer to save \$10, you may transport these items down to the DPW yard located at 99 Dey Road when the Recycle Shed is open. Please take note that due to limited personnel, help will not be available to unload item(s). The shed is open from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm first Friday of each month. When a legal holiday falls on this day, the second Friday is the rescheduled date.

Items accepted at the recycling shed include computers (monitors, scanners, CPU's modems, printers, cables, and keyboards) televisions, small hand held gaming devices, telephones, irons, strands of lights, thermostats, thermometers and formed Polystyrene (not loose packing peanuts).

The drop off recycling service is for Cranbury residents only and will be manned while open. Proof of residency will be required when disposing of your e-cycle. No hazardous waste, paint or tires or broken fluorescent bulbs will be collected at this site. We ask that you deposit your rechargeable, button batteries or cell phones at Town Hall (in the DPW office, 2nd floor) during normal business hours.

Clean loose packing peanuts are accepted at Pak Mail, 319 Route 130N (Shop-Rite Ctr.), East Windsor, NJ. Call 609-443-6245 for hours of operation. For other NJ locations that accept the packing peanuts visit www.loosefillpackaging.com.


